Co-President's Message

If you were able to attend our branch meeting in March, you gained some interesting and amusing insight into the lives of two women who were among the first female graduates of the Naval Academy at Annapolis. It was obvious that they were young women who had the willpower and perseverance needed to be trailblazers.

Speaking of trailblazing women, I'd like to call your attention to a National Public Radio broadcast heard recently. It was a segment of Science Friday with host Ira Flato entitled "Writing Women Back into Science History". It was a fascinating discussion of unsung heroines in the fields of science and technology.

One such group of women was a team of six women who programmed the ENIAC, the first all-electronic, multipurpose computer developed during WW II. Basically, these women developed the software needed for the computer. They were never recognized to the same extent as the men who developed the hardware. Also mentioned were Maria Sibylla Merian, the 17th century "mother of entomology," whose watercolors documented insect metamorphosis and Marie Tharp, whose maps of the ocean floor paved the way for continental drift theory.

Many listeners called in to mention other accomplished women scientists whose contributions have not been fully acknowledged. The consensus was they these women can serve as role models for young girls aspiring to STEM careers.

I encourage you to go to the website sciencefriday.com and find the March 20 program. It was a very interesting and enlightening discussion I think you will enjoy. (You can also access it through the NPR website.)

An aside: I recently read about the two co-founders of AAUW. One was Ellen Swallow Richards. She attended Vassar, earning her degree in 1870 after just two years of study. She was the first US woman to earn a bachelor's degree in Chemistry. She then attended the Massachusetts Institute of Technology on "special student" status since women were not able to be admitted. She completed the requirements for a master's degree at MIT but the degree had to be granted by Vassar since women could not, at that time, receive a degree from MIT. She also completed the requirements for a doctorate but was never awarded the degree. She remained affiliated with MIT as an instructor and was also an accomplished industrial and environmental chemist.

News from a STEM Award recipient

Dear Douglas County AAUW,

This is Louise Kuehster, one of the recipients of your STEM scholarship last year. Of course, the scholarship is greatly appreciated and went towards paying my fees last semester. I came across the envelope you gave me and wanted to let you know how school was going. I'm currently attending the University of Oklahoma studying chemical engineering with an emphasis on biotechnology. I've also added an additional major in Chinese. I've studied Chinese for six years and I see no good reason to stop now. Double majoring in chemical engineering and Chinese might be a lofty goal, but I'm hoping I'll be able to do it since I have some transfer credits from AP and IB classes in high school.

In any case, I've survived my first semester of college and am well into my second. Last semester, I took an easy course load because I didn't want to overextend myself before I even got to second semester. I took an intermediate Chinese class that turned out to be much easier than I expected, and two international studies classes (in order to fulfill requirements for the Global Engagement Fellowship, a program at OU that promotes international awareness and provides participants with funding for study abroad). I also took expository writing, a one hour engineering orientation class, and Calculus III. All of those amounted to 16 hours of credit. This semester I took 16 hours again, but I have a much more difficult set of classes. I'm currently taking organic chemistry, introductory physics, differential equations, Chinese, and Honors Perspectives, which is discussion based that, despite being discussion based, involves a lot of reading and writing. My classes this semester are a bit more difficult, but so far I enjoy them more than my classes last semester. I missed having science classes last semester, and International studies are interesting, but not nearly as much as chemistry or math.

In addition to school, I've gotten involved in other ways on campus. I'm a Global Engagement fellow at the University of Oklahoma, which has kept me involved in International events on campus. As a Global Engagements fellow, I attend international event on campus, participate in OU Cousins, which pairs American students with International students, with the hope of creating lasting friendships, and write a blog about the Global Engagement Fellowship. Another requirement of the fellowship is that I study abroad and I'll receive funding from the program to do so. I'm planning on studying abroad in China next fall because that semester is the easiest to miss without getting behind in my chemical engineering degree. Organizing that and getting all the right classes has turned out to be a bit of a nightmare, but going to China will be worth it. I've also continued my involvement in sports, but I switched gears from running to rowing. OU has a DI team, of which I am not part, but I did join the club team at the beginning of last semester. It's been a lot of fun and as a club team it hasn't been too big of a time commitment. The main point of school is ultimately to learn, not to be good at rowing!

Again, I greatly appreciate the scholarship you gave me, along with your recognition of my hard work in high school. I'll continue to work hard in hopes of continuing to be worthy of such recognition. I hope that everything is going as well for the members of AAUW as it is for me.
