### Fleta W. Nockels

September 14, 1930-November 3, 2018

Fleta Nockels' family had been in upstate New York for generations. She grew up there with two brothers. She could have remained there to teach, but instead she decided to have an adventure and drove west in her little Fiat. She landed in Castle Rock, Colorado. At that time, it was a little farm town close to the mountains and also close to city life in Denver. She applied for a job with the Douglas County School District and was hired. Many of her earliest and lifelong friends were other single young teachers with their first jobs.

She caught the eye of local bachelor, Jack Nockels, who thought that the new school teacher was the one he wanted to court and marry. Their backgrounds were very different but they shared the same values and complemented each other. They lived on Jack's family property up Jarre Canyon. Jack worked for the highway Department and Fleta got used to driving 9 miles from Sedalia up and down winding mountain roads

Fleta was an excellent hostess. She was usually making meals in her small kitchen and was frequently stepping around at least one big hairy dog. The kitchen had running water but there was no indoor plumbing—just a path to the outhouse. She had three daughters—Edie, Marge, and Carolyn. There were many birthday celebrations and 4th of July parties held on the Nockles' property.

When Fleta returned to teaching after being home with her daughters, educational practices had changed radically, but it didn't take her long to adapt. It was during this time that she became President of the Douglas County Federation of Teachers. She later became president of the Colorado Federation. She was very much an activist. In any group she joined, she usually became an officer. She was active with the Douglas County branch of AAUW, as well as the historical society and her church.

Fleta dealt with many losses: Jack died and she had to sell her beloved home and move into Bonaventure. She then sold her car and the independence that came with it. Later she developed macular degeneration and gave up book club. Finally, she traded a walker for a wheelchair. Nevertheless, Fleta always kept a positive attitude and had friends and family that rallied around her.

Fleta Nockels is remembered as one of the **founding mothers** of Douglas County AAUW. Her family has requested that in lieu of flowers, friends and family remember her with a donation to our local club's education fund. We are grateful for this expression of love for a life well lived.

The Denver Art Museum debuts **Dior: From Paris to the World**, an exhibition surveying more than 70 years of the House of Dior's enduring legacy and global influence. A selection of more than 200 haute couture dresses – as well as accessories, photographs, original sketches, runway videos, and other archival material-traces the history of this haute couture fashion house. The dresses along with 5 women fashion dressers arrived from Paris about the beginning of November. The sets, created by a well-known set designer, showcase 15 themes with the dresses artfully displayed within them. Works of art that were inspiration for the designers at The House of Dior are hung beside some of the dresses. One set has Monet's Garden as its theme. Another set has the dresses, that are first created from sketches, then patterns, made up in linen. These are then modified before the expensive fabrics are cut. Still another set has the accessories created to complement each collection showcased.







# HISTORY AND CULTURE GROUP WALKING TOUR OF ELIZABETH

Eleven members of the History and Culture Interest Group traveled to Elizabeth, November 15, to learn more about the history of this prairie town established in 1890. It was the commercial center for homesteaders living in the eastern part of our county. A walk up and down Main Street was organized by Pat Gonzales, Assistant Director of Community Development for the town. She told us that the location of the railroad tracks, which were parallel to main street, dictated where the train station, housing for railroad workers, general mercantile, hotels and other businesses were located. We lingered to read plaques at the D&NO Section House which is now an Art Gallery, and were entertained by the proprietor of Powder River Co as he told us about the custom hats that he makes individually for famous and not so famous clients around the country. Doris MacDougall, pictured here, was the model to show us how the form, he uses, ensures a perfect fit. At the end of our walk, we stopped to see the old beautifully carved bar in a historic building that is now the Mountain Man Nut and Fruit Co. We had a delicious lunch at The Carriage Shoppes Tea Room. Linda, the owner, bought the business last April and together with her daughter, who is an interior designer, worked to create the rooms, with a charming tea house atmosphere, where tea and lunch are served. After lunch, we couldn't resist shopping in the adjacent antique and gift shop.




### History and Culture Club
