
#### TREASURER'S REPORT

AAUW has made a commitment to actively support several bills in the Legislature. Actively support means submitting letters or testimony in support of the bill.

An update on the list includes:

HB21-1097 Establish Behavioral Health Administration

HB21-1161 Suspend Statewide Assessments for Select Grades

SB21-073 Civil Action Statute of Limitations Sexual Abuse

SB21-089 Cancer Screening Services Through CDPHE

Also a big reminder to go to the national website, if you have not already received an email, and vote for the upcoming issues for AAUW.


