The treasurer's records were reviewed for the period July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021. The checkbook was verified against the bank statement as of June 30, 2021 which showed the following balance: \$7,189.78.

Various files and reports were discussed. Our liability insurance is currently discontinued. We may renew at any time we feel we need it again with no penalty. Our contribution to the National AAUW Fund in the amount \$1080.00 was paid in December, 2020. Our Fall Scholarships were distributed to two recipients in the total amount of \$6000.00. We complied with verification of Federal Tax submission with National.

The files are in good order and reports clear and concise. Records are well organized and easily available to membership if requested.

We are fortunate to have Marsha Johnson as our treasurer.

#### NOTE from the Treasurer - "DOLLARS FOR SCHOLARS"

Ladies,

Two years ago, our branch decided to focus on funds to assist women in their pursuit of continuing higher education. For this year, the Board decided to begin our annual "Dollars for Scholars" campaign now as this is one of our most important fundraisers. Some of you have already sent money and have been extremely generous. For that, we are all very grateful.

Jean Kovatovich has chaired the committee for several years and has repeatedly found excellent candidates who are very worthy of our efforts. Currently, she has found two women pursuing continued education in the medical field. One is a previous recipient entering her fourth year of medical school. The second is a single mother studying in the field of nuclear medicine.

We traditionally have given scholarships in the amounts of \$1500 to \$2000 to 3-4 applicants. Our current budget has \$2528.09 in our scholarship fund. Therefore, we have cut off the application process for this year due to a lack of funds.

Please help in our efforts to grow this fund. In the past years, we've asked that each of our members donate \$50 towards scholarships. Last year, roughly 60% donated. In former years, we've had as high as 96% participation.

As mentioned in the treasurer's budget report, we are waiting until December to award the scholarship money, hoping to build on our funds.

LET'S STEP UP this year! "Dollars for Scholars" is our branch's main mission locally. Let's make a difference and help those in need. Donations of any size are important.

#### PUBLIC POLICY UPDATE

### via Diane Norten, Public Policy Chair

Politics does not stop just because the Colorado legislature is not in session. Many of the bills passed in the 2021 legislative session went into effect in July. The 120 day session had many challenges, with COVID interfering. Over 600 bills were presented including items on health care costs, gun legislation, transportation funding, tax codes, marijuana, plastic bags, child sexual abuse, tenant rights, work place harassment and many more. 503 bills passed the general assembly in 2021, 213 have already been signed as of June. To check on the standing/passage of bills, search on Colorado Legislative session 2021.

AAUW Colorado supported bills related to women's reproductive health and justice, behavioral health issues, women's economic and workplace issues and equity and technology in education. Efforts were successful in these areas. AAUW issues to be focused on during the upcoming session will be determined by the state public policy committee which meets each summer. The focus will be presented at Public Policy Day in February, 2022.

There is much information on Public Policy on the national level. There are copies of communications sent to Congress regarding concerns on Title IX, women's economic conditions, education and many more. They are interesting reads and I urge you to visit the national site to see how our dues are used. www.AAUW.org,; go to policies.
