January 17: Our January meeting will focus on film stars who have made a contribution outside of the film industry. We will watch a DVD documentary on the life of actress, Hedy Lamarr and note any other women who have contributed outside of their well known industry. Bring your popcorn or snack and a beverage and relax watching the DVD.

Hedy Lamarr was born in 1913 in Austria. She was an Austrian born, American actress who did not receive recognition for her inventions until after her film career ended. By the time she was 10 she was a proficient pianist and dancer and could speak four languages. She went to Hollywood in 1937, after leaving a restrictive marriage. She starred in many films but one of her most famous statements was "Any girl can be glamorous; all you have to do is stand still and look stupid."

In collaboration with George Antheil, she invented an electronic device that minimized the jamming of radio signals. The device is a component of present-day satellite and cellular phone technology.

JoAnn grew up in Yuma County, Colorado, and her approach to education and life reflected the eastern plains values of hard work, persistence, and dedication to family, friends, and causes dear to her heart. JoAnn became a teacher, reading specialist, elementary principal, and assistant director of Special Education for Douglas County Schools. She had a positive influence on everyone who met her. JoAnn was respected by others and she demonstrated respect for others...even if she might have disagreed with their point of view! She could definitely assert her "feisty" attitude when needed but behind it all was a loving and caring human being who wanted the best for everyone.

Over the years I had the privilege of spending more time with JoAnn on AAUW (American Association of University Women) projects and groups.
